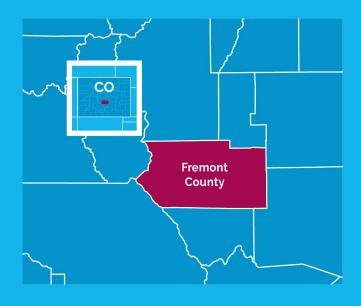

Defining a Quality By-Name List

Colorado BoS CoC - Fremont County has met all of the quality and reliability thresholds.

FULL COVERAGE

- All agencies and programs are represented
- List includes people sleeping in shelters and on the streets

PERSON-LEVEL DATA

- Each person has an entry that includes their name, history, health and housing needs
- Each person can be followed through the system

RELIABILITY

• Data balances month over month, just like your checkbook

REGULAR UPDATES

- List is updated monthly, at a minimum
- As people's housing status changes, so do their list entries

Qualitatively Assessing a BNL

Colorado BoS CoC - Fremont County reached a perfect score on the All Single Adult scorecard in March 2020 successfully meeting the framework below to produce their veterans by-name list. 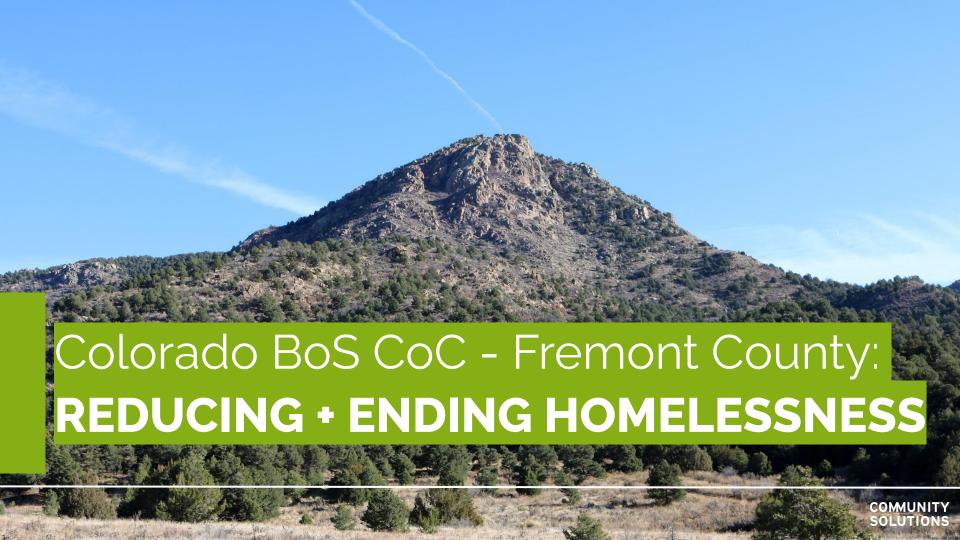

Data Reliability

Data for Colorado BoS CoC - Fremont County is perfectly balanced (0% data reliability) meaning that changes in actively homeless numbers are accounted for in inflow and outflow. This signals that data management practices are robust and efficient and that data is being tracked in a consistent manner.

Reductions in Actively Homeless Veterans-Successful Improvement Projects

1. Community Kick Off Event | Nov 2019

- To get the community aligned behind the goal of ending veteran homelessness, the Fremont County improvement team held an event to educate the community on the goal.
- o Impact: Enlisted volunteers for outreach, assessment and case conferencing.

2. Organized, Community-Based Street Outreach | Feb 2020

- Beginning in Nov 2019, community organizations and volunteers independently organized outreach efforts to help connect people to resources and to improve data quality.
- o Impact: By improving outreach, Fremont was able to reach 100% on the BNL scorecard.

3. Community Partners Complete Housing Assessments

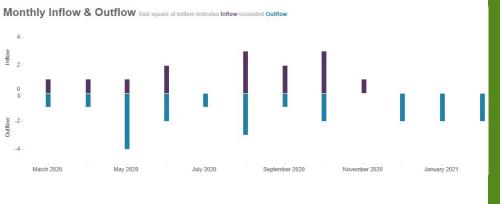
- Fremont County improvement team trained 125 people across 15 community agencies to complete VI-SPDAT assessments.
- o Impact: Improvement in the quality of data on the BNL and ability to case conference more accurately.

4. Real Time, Quality By-Name List Case Conferencing | Oct 2020

- Fremont County began meeting weekly to discuss veterans, and began discussing cases strategically.
- o Impact: With confidence in the data, Fremont County providers began case conferencing in phases, increasing the speed at which veterans moved into housing.

Actively Homeless - Monthly Veteran Count



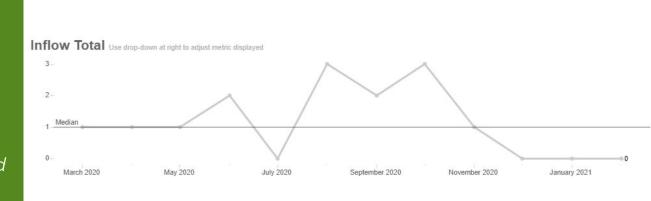


Balancing Inflow and Outflow:

Thanks to local funding sources, a housing navigator was hired to help with housing search and placement for the greater number of people identified as homeless through the improved community outreach coverage. Housing navigation efforts kept driving progress to zero even while more people were identified.

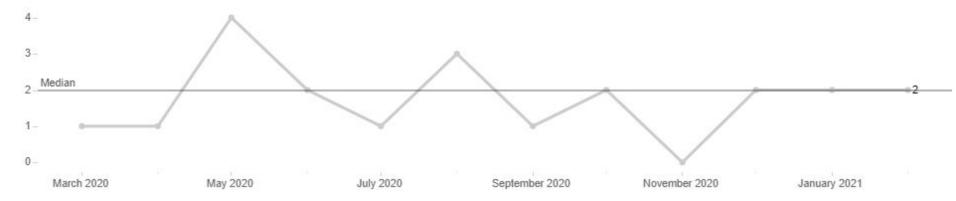
Notes on Inflow:

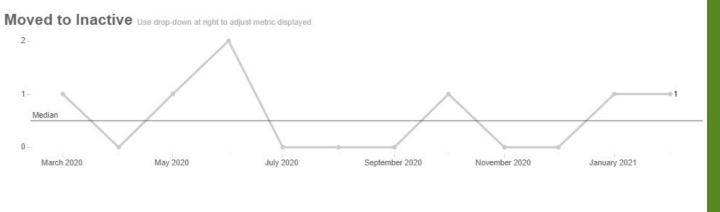
With the advent of community outreach, the Fremont County team improved community coverage and the number of newly identified people increased. As their system could rely on the improved data and began planning with it, they were able to drive the numbers back down again.



Outflow Total





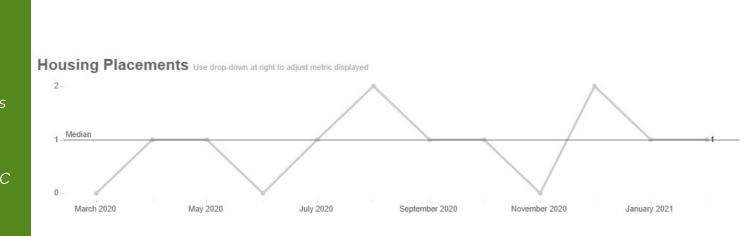


Outflow Notes:

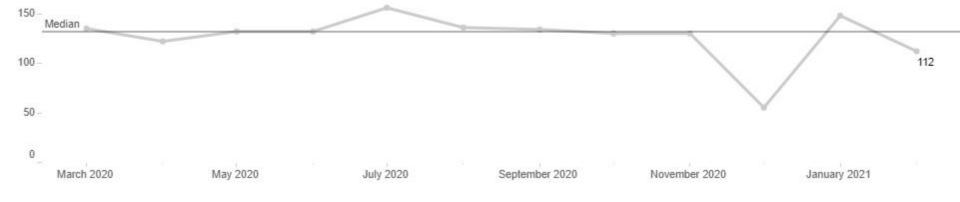
Notes on housing placements:

Sustaining: A Working Definition



actively homeless veterans when functional zero reached

(or 3 veterans, whichever is greater)

Community Strengths

- The right community members were at the table from the beginning, and they were willing to set goals in spite of immediate hurdles.
- A committed, solutions-focused team that shows creative resourcefulness- they are always looking for the next thing to help their clients.
- Support from the Department of Housing that path-cleared through barriers that couldn't be solved for locally
- Buy-in from the Mayor, City government officials, and County government officials.
- Pass through funding from the Ballmer Group provided a flexible funding pool for housing people with greater needs.
- Strong leadership and tireless optimism, confidence and kindness. Created a leadership structure where each member could let their unique strengths shine.
- A Data Lead took ownership of working with By-Name List data from day one, which means the team could hit the ground running.

Possible Barriers to Sustaining

- Expanding outreach to rural areas and to a different subpopulation as Fremont County pivots toward ending chronic homelessness.
- Maintaining access to flexible or long term rental assistance funding.
- Maintaining excitement and alignment with the goal of sustaining an end to veteran homelessness.
