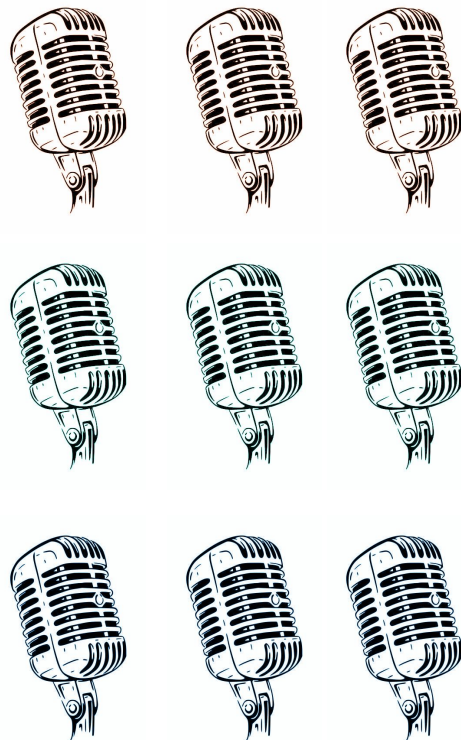

Celebrating Quality Data!!

BFZ communities who have reached Quality Data in one or more populations



Quality By-Name Data demonstrates a community's ability to

- ✓ *List all known individuals, including those who have not yet been assessed or consented to services*
- ✓ *Coordinate outreach coverage*
- ✓ *Maximize provider participation*
- ✓ *Implement an inactivity policy*
- ✓ *Track current and historical list status' of all known individuals*
- ✓ *Track newly identified individuals*
- ✓ *Track those returning to active homelessness*
- ✓ *Track housing placements*
- ✓ *Track chronicity and veteran status*
- ✓ *Track population and household status changes*
- ✓ *Include self-identified race and ethnicity on the by-name list to be used to analyze system outcomes*

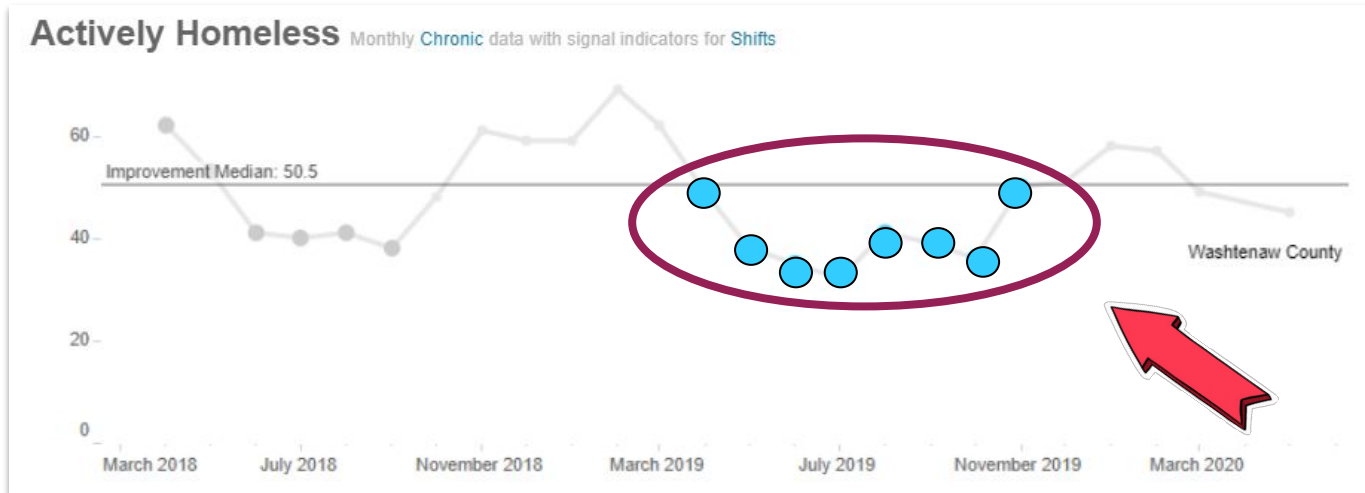


Wait, what's a shift?

What's a Shift?

The Improvement Median represents the system “norm” — what we expect the system to produce if we don't change anything about it.

- Once the median is set, new data points will naturally fall above and below the median at random
- Six points in a row above or below the median, however, is statistically significant! Try flipping a coin and getting six heads in a row — it's highly unlikely to happen at random! This is called a **shift**.
- Shifts signal a change in system performance.



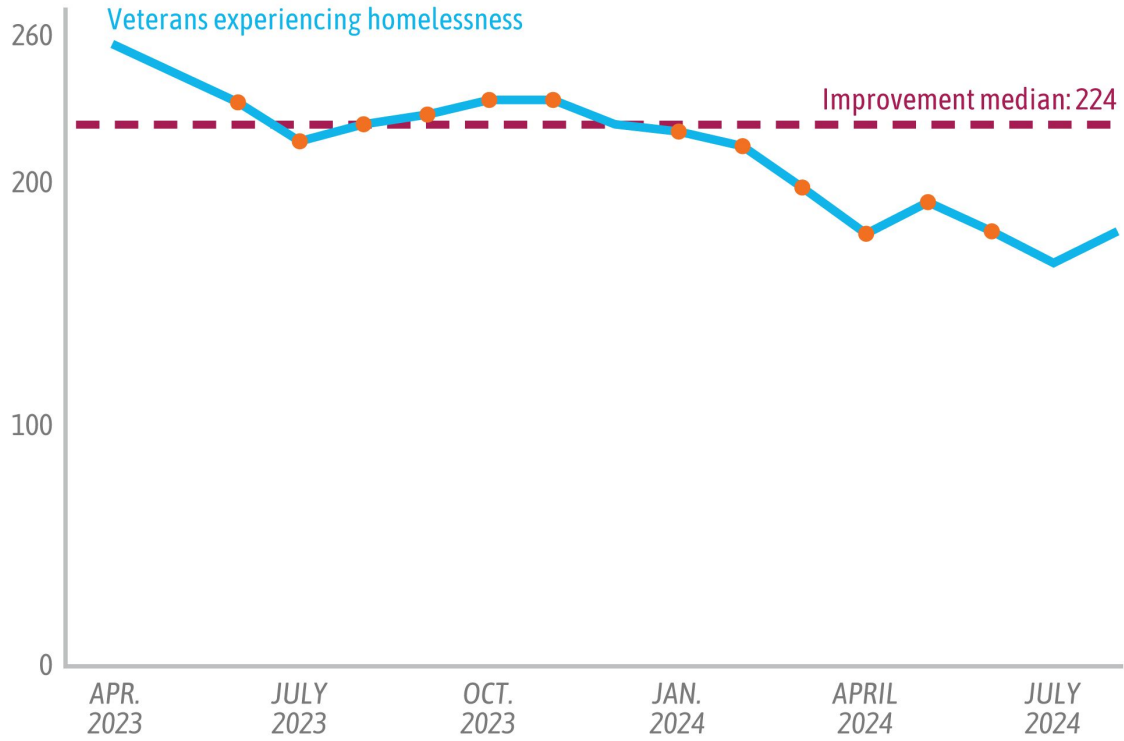

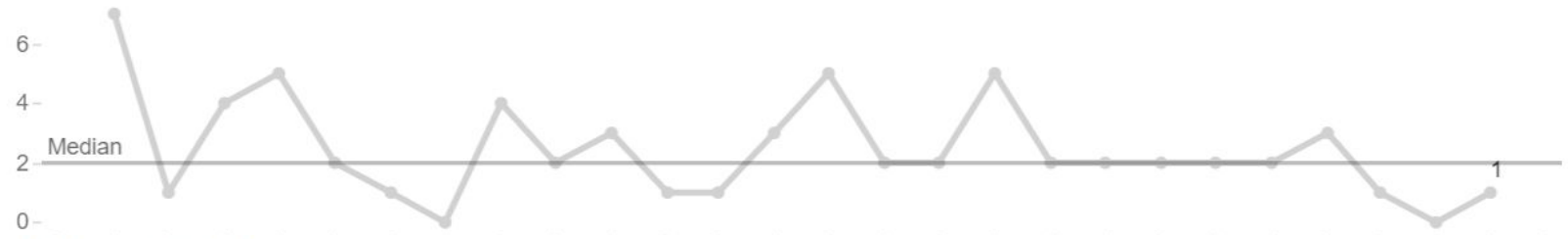

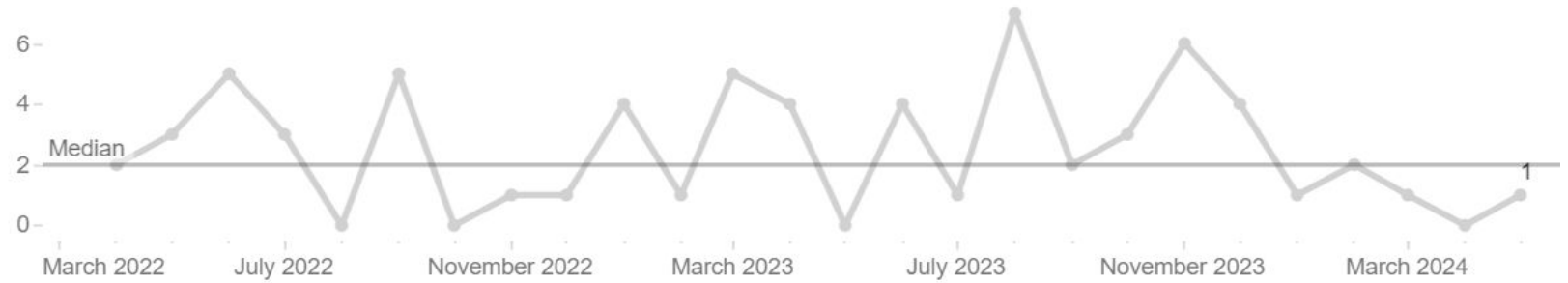
Inflow Total Use drop-down at right to adjust metric display

Innovation in Inflow Reduction

Collaboration with Law Enforcement:

- Designated officers trained in homelessness outreach & CES Assessment
- Officers connect individuals with services rather than defaulting to incarceration

Diversion Strategy:

- Focused on non-shelter solutions to resolve homelessness

Faith-Based Prevention Support:

- Churches provide financial aid, temporary housing; prevents homelessness before it starts

Reduced Criminalization:

Homeless individuals connected with services, not the justice system

Increased Community Support:

Fewer individuals entering the homeless services system

Real-Time Data Tracking:

Enhanced coordination through case conferencing and data sharing

Collaborative and Innovative Approaches for Sustainable Housing Solutions.

Cross-sector Partnerships and Alignment

- Open Doors, a community partnership comprising real estate developers, building owners, nonprofit service providers, and funders, swiftly links homeless households with apartments.
- Data-driven case conferencing

Resource Mobilization and Alignment

- Partnership with DeKalb County Public Housing Agency (PHA) to house willing households from Fulton County

Reducing Unsheltered Homelessness

- Direct to Housing Encampment Strategy, led by Clutch Consulting

Open Doors: Ensures quick connections to affordable housing, equitable access

DeKalb County PHA Partnership: Increases voucher distribution effectiveness

936 people matched to units on the private rental market within an average of 33 days.

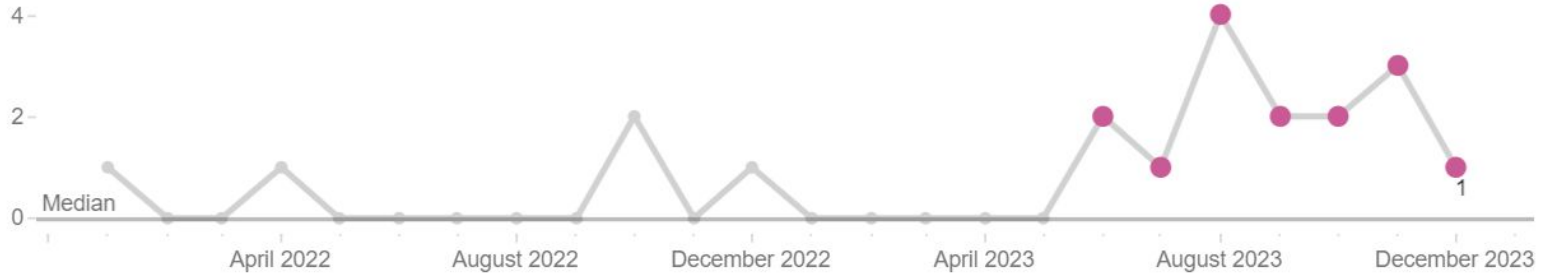

Outflow Total

Outflow successfully increased over a 6-month period



Outflow Strategies

- Partnership with Public Housing Authority to prioritize people with disabilities and those fleeing DV
- Leveraging state and local funding in addition to CoC and ESG funds to increase housing program supply

Stabilizing Housing for Vulnerable Populations

Data-informed practice to reduce inflow & a coordinated prevention prototype

Hartford, Connecticut:

- Identified individuals at-risk of homelessness by using zip codes with high inflow
- Prioritized services for Black men exiting incarceration
- Allocated \$2.2 million for homelessness prevention and RRH programs
- Stabilized individuals across 15 households

Shelter diversion

Mecklenburg Co. (Charlotte, NC)

- Enhanced street outreach
- Focused housing stabilization for African Americans
- Prevented shelter entry for over 100 individuals, including large families

System commitment and leadership

Lane County (Eugene, Oregon)

Coordinated, standardized prevention to allocate resources across partners to meet the needs BIPOC and veteran households.

Broad and diverse coalition of partners

Hamilton County (Cincinnati, OH)

Partners include experts with lived experience of homelessness, libraries, food pantries, clergy, and family services.

Preventing inflow

Contra Costa County (California)

Expanded reach of the *So Keep People Housed* program (KPH) to provide equitable access to financial assistance, legal representation, & supportive services for prevention.

Metro Denver's All In Mile High Initiative is reducing unsheltered homelessness!

How did they do it?

- **Shared alignment and commitment:** Mayor Johnston declared a state of emergency and the goal to move 1,000 people indoors.
- **Targeted outreach:** Transitioned unsheltered individuals to 8 new transitional housing sites, closing encampments permanently.
- **Extensive community engagement and collaboration:** Engaged nonprofits, faith leaders, and businesses citywide. Held over 60 public meetings to gather input and shape public narratives.
- **Equitable and Person-Centered Approach:** Offered non-congregate housing and comprehensive wraparound services, along with private transitional housing.

Systems Outcomes

- One year following the launch of the emergency declaration, the **administration has completely redesigned the city's approach to people living in encampments.**
- 36% reduction in 9-1-1 calls.
- 49% reduction in 3-1-1 calls related to encampments.

1,673 individuals moved indoors!

583 people permanently housed!

A MOVEMENT TO END HOMELESSNESS

Minneapolis/St. Paul, Minnesota, reduced veteran homelessness by 26%!

How did they do it?

- **Focus on continuous improvement and collaboration:** New partnerships helped find more gaps, grow resources, and align them better.
- **Leveraged BFZ funding** to test new interventions and advocate for state resources, resulting in new programs, additional housing, and permanent state funding.
- **Used by-name data & statewide registry:** The Minnesota Department of Veteran Affairs (MDVA) registry surfaced disparities and informed programming to support veterans with higher barriers to housing.
- **Veterans Supportive Housing Options:** Targets properties off the market to prevent displacement and supports high-need veterans.
- **Homes for Veterans:** Encourages landlords to rent to veterans with non-traditional screening criteria.
- **Veteran Temporary Emergency Housing Voucher Program (V-TEMP):** Provides temporary hotel accommodations for veterans.

Systems Outcomes

System Expansion:

- Broader eligibility for homeless programs
- Increased state-level funding and sustained partnerships

Key Partners:

- MACV, Minneapolis VA Medical Center, MDVA, and county service organizations

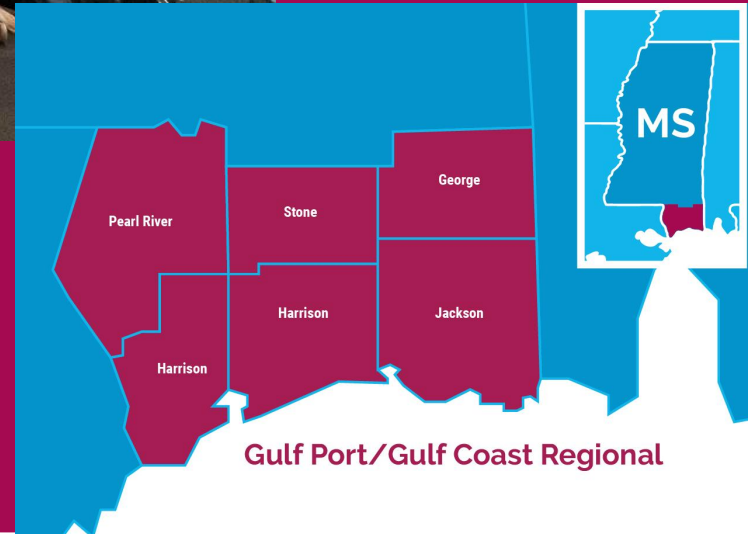

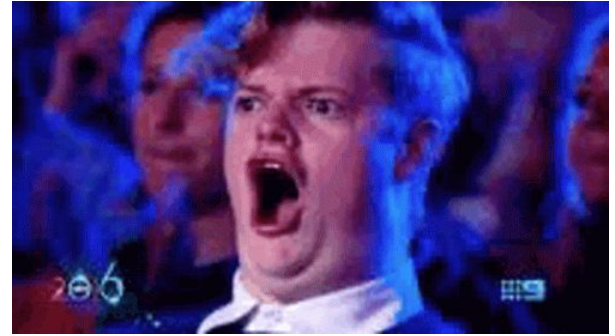




Gulf Coast Region
