# **Kickstarting Property Engagement**

Prior to creating and distributing any incentives, a strong relational foundation must be built. This work group will be the primary space for decision making, strategic design, and collective impact. You will leave this session with a comprehensive working group formation guide, equipped with meeting materials and activities, as well as the opportunity to hear from and ask questions of our three panelists who have successfully launched property engagement initiatives in their Built for Zero communities.

# **Considerations for Equity**

In establishing and conducting the activities of your working group, it is essential to prioritize equity at every stage. Carefully consider the composition of your group, ensuring diverse representation and inclusivity among those invited to participate. When assessing property needs, applicant aspirations, and the geographical distribution of properties, be intentional in your outreach efforts to encompass all relevant voices.

Additionally, evaluate the accessibility of meetings and the resources you develop. This includes the clarity of language used, the choice of terminology, and any requirements for accessing tools and information. By fostering an equitable environment, you will enhance the effectiveness and inclusiveness of your work.
